Mystery Lake Musings

It's a mystery why 4 people and 1 dog would want to be dropped off on a lake, in the middle of the wilderness. A lake that has no portage out of it, and no camp sites marked on it. We found out why it's called Mystery Lake the hard way. It's not the journey as they say, it's the adventure!

1. Vista Road Entry:

Flindt River through Heathcote, Heafer, Wilkie, and Tew lakes- Wabakimi-Lower Wabakimi-McWade-Granite-Brennan-Jeep-Change-Dagger-Eagle-Beaver-Snake-Windfall-Allanwater-Stump-Gault-Flindt-Flet- then retraced our route back though Heafer, Heathcote to Vista

I was studying my Wabakimi maps to figure out our next trip, there was a lake that kept jumping out at me and you guessed it, it was Mystery Lake. On the maps and Paddle Planner that I used, it looked like a place that not many people have been to, because there isn't a marked portage to leave the lake and no marked camp sites, (imagine that). But you can see where there is a creek that leaves Mystery on the east end that leads to a small pond about a ¼ mile away. Piece of cake, right? Then on the east end of the pond it looks like it would be a bushwhack for about a ¼ mile to get to the Nemo River system. No big deal, right? So, it's settled Mystery Lake it is.

There were 4 of us on this trip, Mike and Tara in one canoe, Jean, myself and my husky, Nikita in another canoe. At approximately 3 p.m. that afternoon (insert date), we loaded the Otter float plane from [Mattice Lake Outfitters](#), and we were off. It was about a ½ hour flight and from the air I could see the lake. We touched down on the lake, loaded our gear into the canoes and then watched our ride disappear off into the distance.

Now to find a suitable spot for a camp for 2 nights. We found a spot on a small peninsula and after a little cutting we had 2 tents set up and a place to call home. I could tell that Tara was a bit concerned about how we were going to leave the lake, because she brought it up several times. In order to ease her mind, we decided to check it out in the morning.

We heard that a few more times during the rest of the trip. At 6:00 p.m. we tried paddling out again and this time both canoes made it and we were back in camp with tired arms. 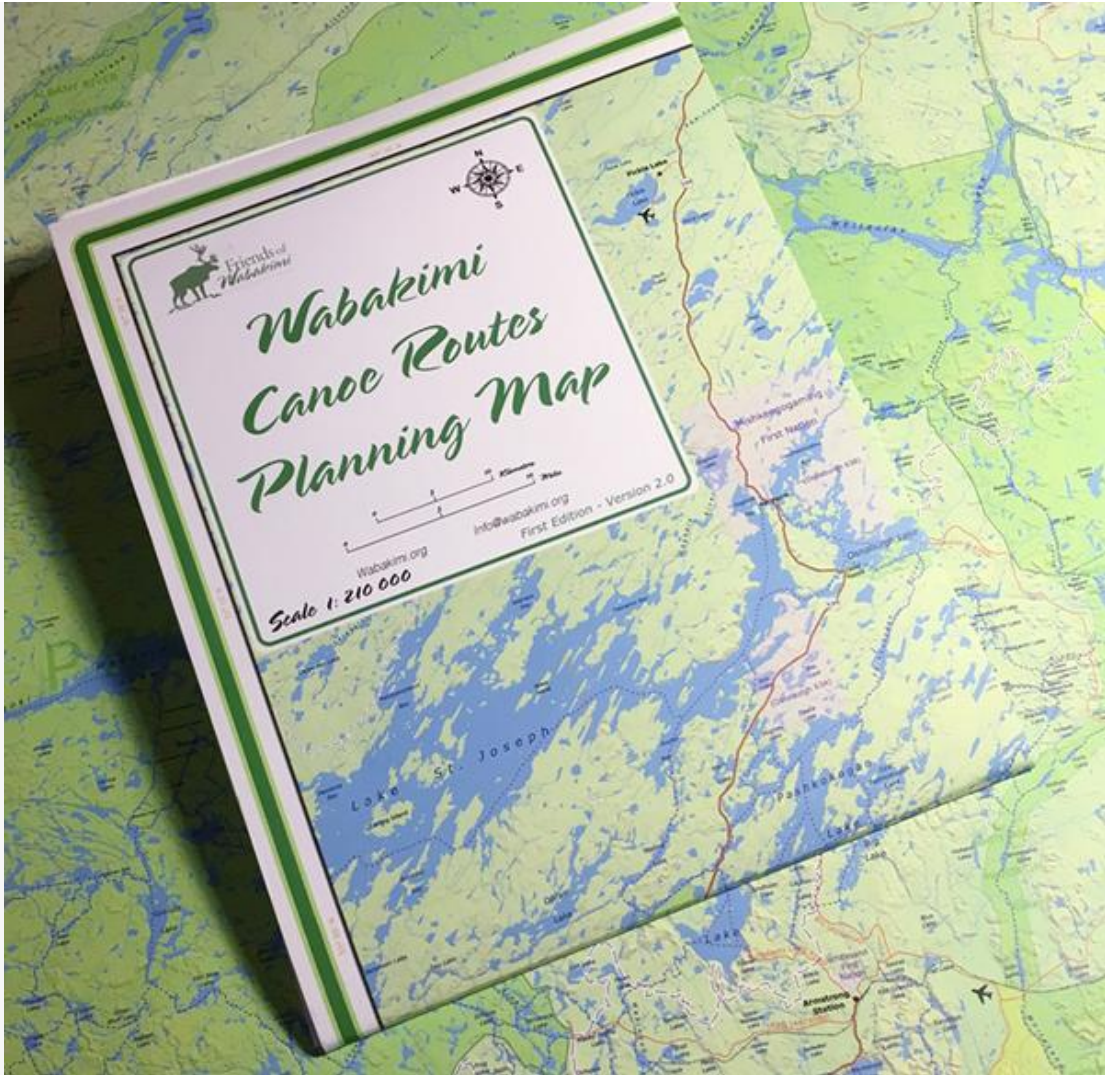


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
